# May 4-5 - At the field; Pattern Aerobatic Fun Fly

## Safety Column

With the weather being cold and miserable the last few weeks it may not seem like it but it won't be long till it will be good flying weather again. That means that now would be a good time to check over your airplanes and equipment to make sure it is ready when the weather cooperates and we can get out and fly.

You can start out by just giving the exterior of your airplane a good looking over. Is the covering in good shape and no holes or tares that need patching? Are there any seams coming loose? Does the covering need to be tightened up? Give the control surfaces a little tug to see if they are good and tight. Move the control surfaces around to make sure they aren't binding up and causing your servos to work harder and pulling more amps from your batteries. How do your control horns look? Are the holes getting worn so that the linkage is loose or dragging? Try wiggling your motor and see if your motor and motor mount are still tight. Also check that your muffler is not loose. Is the landing gear still firmly mounted and the wheels turning free without being to loose? Are the wheel collars tight?

Now that the outside looks good it's time to give the inside a good going over. Are the servos and servo horns tight and

the linkage not binding? Are the servo mounting rails and or plates secure? Are the clevis's secure and have their clips or pieces of fuel tube over them to keep them from opening up? How does the receiver mounting and antenna leads look? Is your battery held in place with Velcro or rubber bands that needs to be replaced? Does the foam rubber around your receiver and or battery need to be refreshed? If you are running glow or a gas motor how does the fuel tank and fuel tubing look? Is the fuel tank secured but still have some foam or rubber to minimize vibration and foaming of the fuel? If you are running electric how does the battery mounting system look? How about all of the wiring from the battery to the ESC to the motor look? Any connections that are loose or wires that are nicked needs to be taken care of.

Now that the airplane checks out and any issues are taken care of it's time to look over your transmitter. Can it stand to be cleaned up a little bit to get rid of some dust, dirt, and glow fuel? Are any of the switches loose and need to be tightened up? Do the sticks still move freely and return to neutral? How old is the battery in your transmitter? If you are using a different transmitter have you double checked all of the programming and double checked that the motor kill switch is operating?

Last but not least look over your field box to see if you have whatever tools and supplies that you might need and replace what ever is necessary. Check your glow drivers, starter batteries, fuel supply etc..

Hopefully we will have another safe flying season with no injuries. Steve
