It's getting to be that time of year when we need to start thinking about the heat and how it affects us. We all know that in Kansas the summertime heat plus the humidity can really affect what you feel like. Remember that the heat does not affect everybody the same. One person may be used to the heat and never seem to be bothered by it while the person next to them may be about to collapse.

We spend many hours at the flying field and the heat can sneak up on you with little warning. If you start feeling light-headed or are just not quite with it you should probably get in the shade and push fluids. If you decide to sit in your car with the air conditioning running be sure to tell others so they are aware of what you are doing and can watch over you.

Be aware of what your body is telling you. This is especially true if you are diabetic. You need to be aware of the symptoms of HEAT STROKE and HEAT EXHAUSTION.

HEAT STROKE — You will have a rapid, weak pulse and feel nauseous or may be vomiting but you will not be sweating. Your skin may be red, hot and dry and you may have a throbbing headache. You may become unconscious. For heat stroke a person needs immediate medical care. Lay the person down in the shade and cool them off with damp rags until medical help arrives. Depending on the circumstances, it may be better to place them in an air-conditioned car and take them to the hospital in Paola. If possible, have another care giver ride with you to take care of the patient while in route.

HEAT EXHAUSTION — You may feel dizzy or faint; you're sweating profusely; your skin is clammy, cool, and pale; you are nauseated or vomiting; you may have muscle cramps; and your pulse is weak and rapid. For a person suffering heat exhaustion you want to move to a cool, shaded place and drink water. Sugary drinks or alcohol are not recommended. Use cool compresses to cool them down.

Note on the included chart how the humidity affects the temperature. You can see that when the temperature is 90 degrees with just 75 percent humidity the heat index is at 109 degrees which is into the danger zone.

Please be safe when you are enjoying this hobby and anytime you are outside in the heat.
